Nothing is impossible.-

On 28-3-2014 we admitted a young woman who is HIV positive and had Tb meningitis. Her condition and health was very poor. Let's call her Nina.......... Nina was a mother like all other, could previously hear and see, but because of her illness she became deaf and blind. She was depressed and could not communicate. During a family conference, her aunt and boyfriend were present and our Multi-Disciplinary Team heard a very sad story.... Both she and her child were in a motor car accident, leaving her child disabled and in the care of the aunt. She also has two other daughters one in school and the other one only four years old. As a child her own mother abused alcohol, and she too, as a child, was placed in the care of the aunt. She was always crying, it was sad to see her just sitting there not really knowing where she is. cried and our hearts went out to her.

One day after much discussion we decide that there must be a way to help her. We put our trust in a team effort which included prayer and tender loving care to the whole family but more to Nina.

One morning one of the Health Care Workers called me and said that she had done a bit of research (google) about signwriting and found that you can communicate to her by writing with a blunt object on the inside of her hand. We put it to the test and she responded, it was a glorious day in the hospice. Her face lit up and for the first time in months we could "speak" to her. She asked so many questions with lots of tears; needless to say we all cried.

The depression was something of the past, and Nina's children visited more often. We then started to focus on getting her hearing and sight back. She was referred to a specialist at George hospital and we never lost faith that things can change for her and that God will heal in some way.

After some time another big surprise came...... Nina started to hear some sounds and she voiced this very loudly.

Today she has almost 80% of her hearing back and we discharged her into the care of her friend thus fulfilling another wish of hers. We did a home visit and our Home Based Care will continue to make regular home visits.

Family from far

Bethesda now has a self-catering Family Unit on the premises. This Unit will be available for the family members of our clients to stay in if necessary. Our young clients admitted to the Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) are often from areas surrounding George & the parents wish to come & spend time with their little ones. However the cost is too high to come through for just a day. With the Family Unit we will now be able to accommodate these families, at no cost, in order for them to spend some time with their loved ones. Various contributions were made to equip this Unit and we would like to thank Hyatt Regency Oubaai, Van Rensburgs Foods & Barkley Oats/Medi-Hire.
